Introduction

Acadians are slowly allowed by the British authorities to return to the Maritimes.	This period has been called the Golden Age of the Acadians. Farming brings prosperity and the population grows from 2 300 to 13 000 inhabitants. B	The first National Acadian Convention takes place and August 15 is adopted as National Day. C	The second National Acadian Convention is organized. A motto, an insignia and an anthem are adopted for the occasion. D
With the Treaty of Utrecht, France concedes Acadia to England. The British rule starts. E	The National Acadian Convention has for theme "Acadia of the world: A new Acadia! Toward a New Beginning!" F	Refusing to take an oath of allegiance while under British rule that included fighting against the French, the Acadians are deported. G	This is a period of Acadian renewal with the renaissance of Acadian pride and identity. H
The first Acadian census is organized in Port Royal. There are 392 people, 482 cattle and 524 sheep.	This is a period of great expansion for Acadie. 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What is culture?

The Oxford dictionary defines culture as "the ideas, customs, and social behaviour of a particular people or society." The Merriam-Webster also points to the beliefs, ways of life and art of a particular society. In class, we invite you to have a group discussion about what is culture, and what it encompasses. To make it even more concrete, we recommend thinking of different examples for each element of the definition. We have regrouped the elements into 4 themes to help you structure your discussion. Keep in mind that they are all interrelated and that there may be overlap.

French Vocabulary List

Language is also a big component of a culture. It could be described as a vehicle of culture. It is through language that people can communicate, interact and express their ideas, their beliefs, their customs and their traditions. For instance, language plays an important role in music where singer-songwriters can express their ideas and express their culture.

While on-tour, we recommend making a list of new French words and taking this opportunity to further your knowledge of the French language.

After your trip

Did you enjoy your Acadian immersion tour? It's time to share your tour highlights with your classmates! What made this trip unique and fascinating? Did you learn any new French words? What was the most interesting food? We invite you to build a PowerPoint presentation on the theme of culture, using your journalistic notes and your tour photos.

We recommend making a presentation with 7-8 slides, so that you have enough content to speak for 5 minutes. **1** - First, create an introduction slide. This slide provides an opportunity to introduce yourself and your presentation. You may want to add a nice photo from the tour which represents Acadian culture.

2 - On the second slide, create your very own definition of what is culture and what it means to you, based on your experience. Remember your group discussion and all the elements that you discussed in class. It will help you build a complete description.

Tip! Take a look in your dictionary to get inspiration and see how a definition is typically written.

3 - On the third slide, answer the following question: What ideas and beliefs do Acadians share? Do you have a supporting picture? Or maybe a supporting story? Provide a concrete example of an idea or belief.



DEFINITION OF CULTURE

4 - On the fourth slide, what are typical Acadian ways of life and social behaviours? For instance, it could be that they are great fishermen and that lobster is an integral part of their gastronomy. Did you observe that too? Did you notice other ways of life or social behaviours? Provide an example.

5 - On the fifth slide, what customs and traditions do Acadians share? Did you observe any customs and traditions at the Historical Acadian Village for example? Do you have a picture or story to share on that topic?

6 - On the sixth slide, present which art forms you noticed while on tour. Did you take a photograph of a sculpture or of a painting? Did you listen to traditional Acadian music during the kitchen party at Pays de la Sagouine? Share with the class one of the Acadian artistic expression that you enjoyed while on tour.

7 - On the last slide, we invite you to share 3 French words which you learned while on tour, and to provide their meaning. If you didn't learn any new words, maybe you can give your impression of Acadian French. Was it easy to understand? Did you have a chance to speak French while on tour?

We hope that this activity will bring back a lot of great souvenirs and that you enjoyed the learning experience. Most importantly, have fun with the presentation!
